## It's magnetic. It's extremely rare. It's the official Rhode Island Rock - Cumberlandite! Judy Hadley shares her knowledge Sunday, April 26, 2pm at North Gate Upstairs Hall

Our state rock, Cumberlandite, is almost exclusively found on a 4-acre lot in the Blackstone Valley. It was first discovered by settlers hundreds of years ago, and used to manufacture farm tools and cannons, although cannons tended to crack.

**Judy Hadley** has been researching this unique rock for several years, and is writing a book on it, to be published

later this year. She will also have with her samples for you to observe. Come and discover more about Cumberlandite, and hear many interesting historical tales of our state rock.

### North Gate gets a facelift thanks to Champlin Foundation

BVHS Member Gail Harris has been successful in writing a winning grant.



The Champlin Foundation has awarded \$59,895 to the Blackstone Valley Historical Society to refurbish the exterior of North Gate Toll House. The project will begin this spring or summer and will include: Replacement of damaged and worn clapboards; rotting trim boards (includes all exterior window trim). Removal of kitchen exhaust fan. Restoring kitchen window and windows in utility room. Replacement

of rotted basement doors and window enclosures. (These repairs to be made before painting the structure.) Prepare, prime and paint the building exterior (walls and trim) in white.

## Blackstone Valley Heritage Corridor awards BVHS \$5,000 Partnership Grant to catalog Society archives



The Blackstone Valley Historical Society received a \$5,000 Partnership Program Grant from the Blackstone Heritage Corridor for the cataloging of the BVHS archives. The grant, which Lori Melucci, treasurer, was instrumental in putting together, will be used to purchase computer equipment and PastPerfect Museum Software. This software sets the collection management standard for

many organizations and is designed to manage all types of collections. The Society is matching this grant with \$4,000 which comes from monetary donations, \$1,000 thus far raised by BVHS, most of which was donated in memory of **Ann Buckley**, the mother of past-president Patricia Armitage, plus in kind volunteer hours and any further donations toward this project. All donations are tax exempt.

**Pat Armitage** will be leading this project, with the help of other members of the society, and a volunteer intern, **Jocelyn Dube**. A graduate of Rhode Island College with a Bachelor's in Anthropology, Jocelyn plans to pursue a Masters in Historical Preservation in the future. In the meantime, she is volunteering at BVHS to help utilize PastPerfect.

The BVHS's collection of photographs, documents, and printed materials was inventoried in 2007 by **Sharon Zagorsky**, a Tufts University graduate, with the help of **Al Klyberg**. An excel file and a printed list was created at that time. This grant allows us to start creating a more functional catalog, which will help us make the materials more searchable and accessible. Last fall, the BVHS received significant new acquisitions from the recently closed Lysander Flagg Museum in Central Falls and we are looking forward to working with them. The entire project is expected to take several years to complete.


The society's collections include lime industry relics, artifacts, books and steriocsopics, other industrial artifacts, books and records. Other collections include land deeds, grants, wills, genealogy books, RI and local history books, family bibles, banking records from Cumberland, tax records for North Providence from the Colonial to Federal era, and other items of interest relating to the history of the six communities in the Blackstone Valley in Rhode Island. This image shows a segment of rail-road track from the historic Iron Mine Railroad. This piece was dug out of the ground behind the Elder Ballou Meeting House Cemetery. The Iron Mine Railroad operated for less than ten years and was used to transport quarried Cumberlandite, which was used as trap rock.

# Local Girl Scout creates a coloring book featuring historical sites in Lincoln

A new coloring book focused specifically on Lincoln's historic sites is now available for purchase after Lincoln resident **Lily Scribner** took it upon herself to create the detailed



drawings for her Girl Scout Silver project.

Scribner, 14, of Girl Scout Troop 339 in Manville, designed the book to earn her Silver Award, the second highest award in Girl Scouts.

She had to submit her drawings and description of the project to a board of directors, who ultimately decided to grant her the award. Scribner, who is homeschooled, said her mother originally brought the idea to her after attending a Blackstone Valley Historical Society meeting one night. "My mom told me they talked about having a coloring book, and I went with that," she said.

She said most children in town do not know about its history, and if they don't know, "why would they want to protect and preserve it when they are older."

With the help of Kathy Hartley, president and CEO of Hearthside House, and Lori Melucci, treasurer of the Blackstone Valley Historical Society, Scribner was able to create drawings of 16 historical sites throughout Lincoln. Each page also features a brief summary of the structure, its historical relevance, and its hours of operation.

The book will be on sale for \$5 in the gift shop at Hearthside, 677 Great Road, and Blackstone Valley Historical Society headquarters at North Gate, 1873 Old Louisquisset Pike. All proceeds go toward the historic sites in this book.
