

excerpt from Dave Harvey's publication *Louisquisset: A Brief History*. In 1660, Capt. John [Whipple] acquired a grant of land and "meadows" in Louisquisset four miles west of Pawtucket and easterly from Lime Rock Village. "Louisquisset is an Indian name for a <u>meeting place</u> or brook in the northeast section of what was to become

Smithfield <u>at the headwaters of the Moshassuck River</u> about two miles west of the Blackstone River." The Moshassuck runs through present day Lime Rock. This tract, consisting of mead-

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ows and fields, is some eight to nine miles north of Providence and included an area "called lime rocks" that eventually became Lincoln. Captain John gave three of his sons this tract of land in "the north woods" but it was not until after King Philip's War (1675) "that settlement began in earnest."




What a great way to spend a summer afternoon...strawberries, shortcake, whipped cream!

Mr. Harvey will speak about his research into the history of the word and the place, Louisquisset, according to <u>American Indian</u> <u>Place Names in Rhode Island: Past and Present</u> (Francis Joseph O'Brien Jr., RIGenWeb Project) is defined as meaning "at the meeting place", and referring to the "TRACT of land through which the turnpike runs at the Lime quarries, in Smithfield on which Jenks lives and the late Elisha Olney". The latter description is probably from Dr. Usher Parsons's 1861 book.

"The location is clearly fixed by a Testimony written by Roger Williams concerning lands bought of Ousamequin, the great Sachem of the Wampanoags, the lands lying "between our bounds at Pautuckqut, and an Indian plantation northwest from thence called Loquasquscit". But the agreement which Williams and his companions made with Massasoit carried the title of the "great meadow at or about Loquasquiscit" to the English settlers forever." p. 162, *The Lands of Rhode Island: As They Were Known to Caunounicus and Miantunnomu when Roger Wil-*
