

One of your books deals with Foster (which is my favorite spot on Earth)... Foster was my most interesting of the six Arcadia books doing research.


Any surprising discoveries writing that book?

Dr. Carpenter was married three times. Two of his wives left him. So when he died it was in his will to bury him and the wife that stayed with him inside an enclosure of four - 4" thick stone slabs to measure 4' high and 12' long to create a square completely enclose them. The other two wives are buried outside of the enclosure. This was to keep their spirits out.

What are some of your favorite spots in the Blackstone Valley? Traveling down Mendon Road and Diamond Hill Road. I love passing through the villages.


