We will never find words to articulate how deeply we will miss you, Al.



**A Movie Matinee!** 

Enjoy selections from the movie, *Senetchonet to Manville: a Journey through Time*, by Betty Mencucci and Carlo Mencucci. (From Ken) - This has been a busy and productive month. We've been researching the now partially available Arnold Cemetery notes at the Providence Library, with the assistance of the archivist Kate Wells. These notes comprise what is left of James Arnold's copious notes and observations of historical cemetery transcriptions done from the 1890's through 1919 in the RI area. Using these notes and research from our site sleuths, we have made finds with two Colonial families in particular-the Ballous and the Harris family. Research done by members of our site combined with recollections of visits past led us to the discovery of 3 pre 1717 burials in the Mann Cemetery yard (Ln #4) that were from the 1685 Peter Ballou family. We have now photographed and identified two of them as William Ballou (died before 1717) and Peter Ballou Jr, who at 21 years of age was July summer heat bathing in the Blackstone when he drowned causing his parents so much grief that they sold the land and moved to Scituate. John Houghton and I traveled to the Judge Mann Lot off Rt 146 and spent an afternoon clearing the Lot of trees and hiking around the old electric car path and the remnants of Albion Road while searching for a second 1805 Ballou Cemetery rumored to be nearby. We didn't find that but observed a lot of hidden walls, and ruins in the nearby woods there. We are still looking for the remains of the Peter Ballou homestead "well" rumored to be on Stump Hill near a spring fed stream called Overlook Brook. John Houghton has done some great deed research on the Moses Ballou Lot (Ln #5), which ties in with some great research from friends of the work, which indicate that that some of the field stones in that yard mark Hannah Ballou (who knew Roger Williams well), her son James, and grandson, Samuel with spouses and kids. These folk were all important to the early economy and settling of the Lincoln area.. Hannah was the daughter of Robert Pike and wife of Maturin Ballou, two folks key to the founding of Providence and RI itself and some of them were witnesses of the King Philipps Conflict...I can't wait to get in that yard and recover and photograph it!

I also got to work on the Harris family mystery Lot which has been hidden away for years on the banks of the Moshassuck River at the intersection of Sherman Ave and Rt 146 across from the old Lime Kiln. This may very well be the resting place of the earliest Harris family members who from the 1650's onwards built and maintained the oldest and most productive Lime Kilns and mines for our area. The Gregory Dexter operation came later and

in the last century combined with the Harris family one to become one enterprise now called the Conklin operation. In future days, I want to get this Harris Lot cleared, surveyed and recovered and publicize its 'connection to the neighboring



Lime Kilns. The graves are so far uninscribed, so it will be a goal to see if we can ID some of the field stones.

In 2017, I would like to see as many of these historical burial yards tied into the local history with signage where possible that the denizens helped to shape and to find as many of the missing locations as is humanly possible before they are developed out of existence-one lost is too many and the fight is ongoing, but as more people become aware of what field stone burials look like and about the important work that we are doing in recovering, mapping and preserving these lots, perhaps we can save some more...

Found in the Archives ...

Picture (below) is a Fire Trump and Silver buckle (found below the Rough and Ready Jr.) that was used by Fire Chief Samuel S. Collyer (1832-1884). Born in Pawtucket in 1832 he worked with the old Rough and Ready Company. He was the first Chief Engineer of the Pawtucket Fire Department. In 1884 he was fatally injured on the way to a fire. A life size statue of him can be found in a small park, known as Collyer Park, is located at the corner of Main Street and Mineral Spring Ave. in Pawtucket.
