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

Reader Identifies Rock in Ballou Photographs

In the September issue, we printed the picture on the left from the Ballou photo album. Three pictures of men climbing on rocks were

placed loosely in the back of the album. This one was the most striking. We asked if anyone could identify the place. I thought it would be somewhere around Iron Mine Hill. However, Bob Lanpher from the North Attleborough Historical Society recognized the rock right away. He wrote to BVHS to say, "Sorry for the late response. But thought that you would want to know that the photo of the tree growing out of the rock was taken on Red Rock Hill in North Attleborough, Mass. The rock was known as Flowerpot Rock for obvious reasons and was a 'tourist attraction' for many years until it was removed when the Wal-Mart Plaza was built."

(continued from p. 1) "The rock was located very near to the entranceway into that plaza along South Washington St., Route 1, in North Attleborough.

I included a very similar photo on page 115 of the book Images of America North Attleborough."


Bob wrote again last month to say, "Finally found the 2 stereo views that I have of the Flower Pot Rock. I am attaching 4 files, 2 of each whole stereo view and 2 close-up scans in case you can use them to compare more closely with the views that you have."

"The one that is marked 'A Freak of Nature' on the front has a back mark for the photographer -'Frank C. Birtles, photographer, Woonsocket, R. I.' This view shows the same stone wall that intersects the rock as shown in one your photos. view also shows a house in the background. I wonder if you could match the house up with any of the houses that you have photos of. There is no other identification on the back of the card, so I suppose that there is some possibility that this is a different rock, but I don't think so." We agree!

"The other stereo view has some old handwriting

on it that identifies it as 'Flower Pot, West Attleborough.' So that one I am sure is of the one that used to be along Rt. 1 in North Attleborough."
