Blackstone Canal: Highway to the Headwaters

ately after the BVHS annual meeting. There will be a shuttle to take people from the small parking lot to the barn.


The Blackstone Canal connected Worcester to Providence and was in use from 1828 to 1848. Construction started in 1825,

and was completed in 1828. It increased prosperity for the Blackstone Valley. Farmers' goods were easier to ship by water instead of along the dirt roads, and mills sprang up along the river. It was a two day trip

for canal boats from Worcester to Providence. An overnight stop was made in Uxbridge. The canal was approximately 35 feet wide and ascended 451 feet, passing through 49 locks. It was designed by Benjamin Wright, chief engineer of the Erie Canal,

and Holmes Hutchinson, later chief engineer of New York's canals. However, in 1847, the Providence and Worcester Railroad opened, and the canal quickly became obsolete.

Remembering Lincoln Woods Dairy

Lincoln Woods was the first state park created in Rhode Island. On February 12, 1909, the Providence Metropolitan Park District Commission met at Hearthside to mark the acquisition of the land. The park was a success from the start.

Arnold The family, whose farm was near the entrance to Lincoln Woods State Park, eventually took note of the park's growing popularity, and decided to add a "milk bar" and ice cream parlor to their dairy farm. It was located in the present day Gateway Park. Lincoln Woods Farm became an attraction in its own right. In Al Klyberg's words, "the Lincoln Woods Dairy at Great Road and Smithfield Avenue was where Saylesville cows' milk was turned into ice cream right before your eyes, only adding to

the treat of the trek to Lincoln Woods."

Harmon Poole from Simsbury, CT, remembered that in the 1930's, the "very modern milking system was made part of the entertainment for those who bought their ice cream at the inside windows. The heavyuddered cows would march into one of the four display stalls and were hooked up to the milkers. Each stall had the cow's name near the large glass tank that was rapidly filling with that cow's milk. Spectators would root for their favorite cows." Mr. Poole believed that the ice cream parlor was invited to have a shop in the 1939 New York World's Fair.

During World War II, Clifton Arnold ran the farm. In 1943, the hayloft of the barn caught fire. The barn was lost and the Milk Bar and Ice Cream parlor took heavy damage. Oliver H. Perry, who joined the fire department at sixteen, remembered being called out of high school in Pawtucket to fight the fire. In 1947, Clif Arnold was interviewed by Dairy World, in an article on Lincoln Woods Farm in the July issue called "Out of the Ashes." Arnold talked about the fire in the interview, saying that he couldn't get enough lumber to rebuild the barn in 1943, so it was built of cinderblocks, and they did a lot of the work themselves. Many people came out to see the ruins after the fire, and



watched the buildings being rebuilt.


By 1947, the Milk Bar was thriving again, selling 1,200 bottles of milk and 500 gallons of ice cream a day on weekends. It had a 25 foot sandwich bar and about 20 tables. The ceiling-high windows into the Milking Parlor were on the inside wall next to the barn.


Several Lincoln residents remembered Lincoln Woods Farm. Dave Rice went there after Pawtucket West high school games in 1948. Glenn Laxton remembered being taken there in the early 1950s. Sometime before 1953, the dairy was purchased by Garelick, but they did not own it long. The barns were taken down by the early 1960s.

Traces of the foundations of the buildings can still be seen in Gateway Park.
