
BVHS Open House on Great Road Day

Haynes Gives Talk on Navy Service in the 1980s and Coming of Age

On September 20, BVHS will have an open house from 11 a.m.-4 p.m.

Northgate, home of the Blackstone Valley Historical Society, was originally built as a tollgate and residence for the toll collector for the Louisquisset Turnpike. The pike was built to expedite the shipment of lime to Providence, and was faster and straighter than Great Road. Over the years, Northgate also served as the home of Lime Rock Grange #22, a popular social gathering place for local farm families.

Next to Northgate is Arnold's Lonsdale Bakery, a

one-story, one-room structure that was relocated and reconstructed on its current site. Arnold's Lonsdale Bakery was founded around 1875 in this building by Joseph Jenks Arnold and his wife. The bakery eventually grew into a thriving business that operated in Saylesville for nearly a century.

On Great Road Day, visitors can explore an exhibit downstairs at Northgate highlighting the historic lime kilns of Lime Rock. The bakery will also be open

for tours. It is a small museum with antique bakery equipment, photographs, and memorabilia from the Arnold family's long-running business.

in the 1970s and 1980s.

In his book, Haynes offers a candid, often irreverent account of a young man's transformation from beersoaked aimlessness in the post-Vietnam 1970s to assuming military duties as a commissioned officer aboard various U.S. Navy vessels during the Reagan military build-up. He invites audiences to follow his transformation in a rapidly changing nation.

All are welcome to attend or if you have time, help out at this event. Both Northgate and the bakery are located at 1873 Louisquisset Pike.

Mayor Opens McCoy Stadium Time Capsules

During the demolition of McCoy Stadium this summer, two time capsules were found. On June 23, Pawtucket Mayor Donald R. Grebien invited the citizens of Pawtucket to be present at their opening.

For most of the over 200 persons who came, in the words of Mayor Grebien, the night was "bittersweet," as they gathered near the dirt pit that had once been McCoy Stadium.

The first time capsule had been laid in the 1940 cornerstone, at the beginning of the baseball field's construction. The second had been buried between the pitcher's mound and home plate in honor of the sport's longest game in 1981.

Grebien, wearing a Paw-Sox jersey, was Master of Ceremonies. He noted the presence of several ball players who had been a part of the longest game, members of the audience who had been season ticket holders, the former PawSox president Mike Tamburro, and City Council President Terry Mercer, who had always lived in the shadow of the stadium.

The first capsule, a copper box, included a letter from the committee who had laid the cornerstone, an envelope sealed with the then-mayor's city seal, and a pamphlet noting that 1940 also was the 250th anniversary of clothmaking in Pawtucket.

The larger 1981 capsule was filled with memorabilia from the game between the PawSox and the Rochester Red Wings, which ended 44 years ago on June 23rd.

The historic game between the Pawtucket Red Sox and the Rochester Red Wings began on April 18 and lasted 32 innings before being halted after nearly nine hours of play. When the game resumed two months later, the PawSox scored in the 33rd inning to break the tie and secure a 3–2 win.

Sealed within a PVC pipe were baseballs with the players' autographs, a Paw-Sox hat, a poster that had been made commemorating the game (a copy of which is now at the Baseball Hall of Fame), a program, the scorebook page, and the official scoring form.

Both capsules and their contents are now housed at the Public Archaeology Laboratory in Pawtucket, for preservation. And, with that, *Continued on p. 3*



On July 15, State Representative Mary Ann Shall-croft-Smith met members of the Blackstone Valley Historical Society at Northgate to present the Society with \$1000 for tools and other supplies to preserve and clean up cemeteries in the region.

Board members of the Historical Society, President Jason Dionne, Treasurer John Houghton, Secretary Francine Jackson and Rev. Ken Postle, BVHS cemetery coordinator, gratefully acknowledged this grant. Postle, who has done significant work for many years restoring local cemeteries and raising awareness of their historical sig-

nificance, explained that the money was needed for tools used to cut back weeds, fallen branches and debris in the cemeteries. He has also made it a priority to make sure that all veterans are properly honored with flags by their headstones.

Shallcroft-Smith acknowledged the arduous task involved in keeping these cemeteries in good condition, and thanked Ken for his service in doing so.
